The Romans

Enquiry Question: Was Roman rule good for Britain?

Key Facts:

- At its height, the Roman empire spanned across Europe, North Africa and the Middle East.
- Roman Britain was a province of the Roman Empire from 43 to 409 AD.
- The Romans originated from Italy and were annoyed with Britain for helping the Gauls (the French) fight against the Roman general Julius Caesar.
- The Romans came to Britain looking for riches: land, slaves, and mostly, iron, lead, zinc, copper, silver and gold. *They stayed in Britain from AD 43 to AD 410; almost four hundred years!
- Legacy: The Romans left their legacy all over the country. They gave Britain new towns, roads, plants, animals, a new religion and ways of reading and counting (currency too). New ways of life including visiting the Roman baths, where people could wash, swim and meet friends.
- The 'Aurelian Moors' are the first recorded African community living in Britain. It is likely that they settled and had families in Britain.



Roman Empire Map

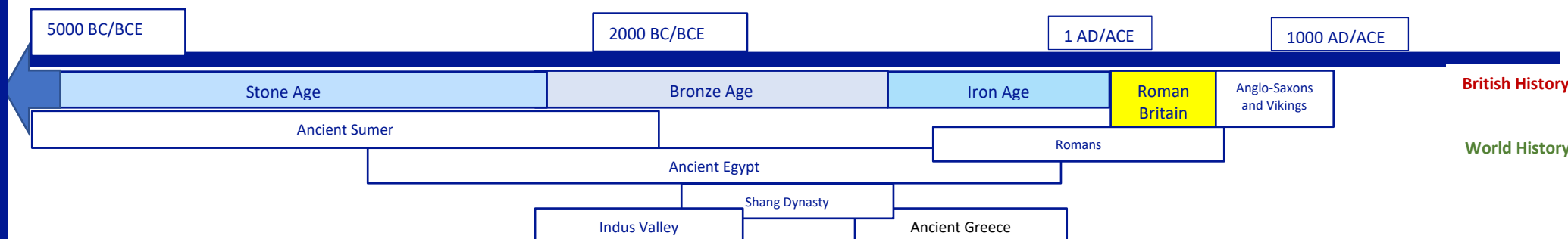

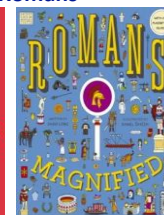

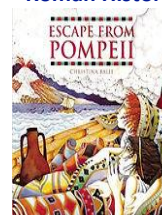
