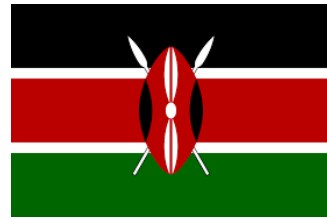

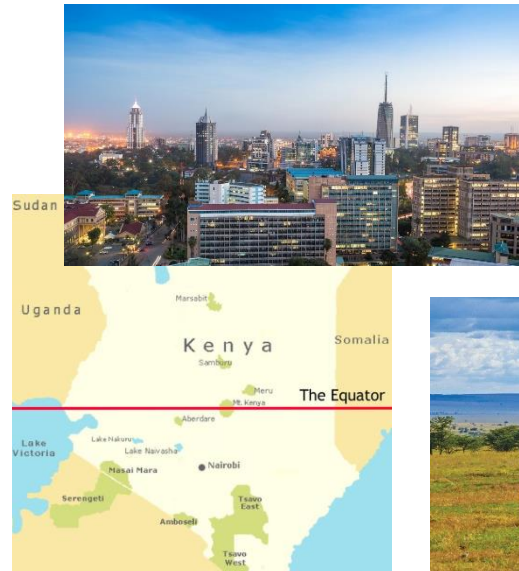
Key Facts:

- Kenya is in the continent Africa.
- The capital city of Kenya is Nairobi.
- It has borders with Somalia, Ethiopia, South Sudan, Uganda, Tanzania and the Indian Ocean.
- Mount Kenya is the highest mountain in Kenya and the second highest mountain in Africa.
- Tsavo National Park is the largest nature reserve in Kenya and one of the largest in the world.
- Kenya is home to many animals including lions, cheetahs, elephants, buffalo, rhinoceroses, leopards and giraffes.
- Kenya's ecosystems include deserts, swamps, mountains and forests.
- English and Kiswahili are the two official languages. There are also many indigenous languages.
- The three largest cities are Nairobi, Mombasa and Kisumu. Over 5 million people live in Nairobi.
- Kenya was a colony of the UK from 1920 to 1963.
- Climate change is having a big impact on Kenya.
- Kenya is mostly tropical and stays hot all year. It has wet and dry seasons.

Glossary:

Africa	The second largest continent.
Kenya	A county in East Africa.
Nairobi	The capital city of Kenya. The largest city in Kenya.
Nature Reserve	A specific area to preserve and protect the animals and plants that live there.
Swahili	(Local name Kiswahili) language spoken in Kenya.
Equator	An invisible line that runs around the centre of the Earth.
Indigenous	Originating in a place, native.
Savannah	A grassy plain in a tropical region with a few trees
Conservation	The protection of habitats and the plants and animals that live there

The Equator

- The Equator is an invisible line that runs around the centre of the Earth.
- The North and South Poles are the places furthest away from the Equator.
- A place is usually hot if it is near the Equator.
- A place is usually cold if it is near the North or South Pole
- The equator runs through Kenya
