Ancient Greece

Enquiry Question: How Did Ancient Greece Change our World?

Key Facts:

- Democracy began in Greece: demos = people kratos = rule
- Ancient Greece was comprised of city states (polis). Each had their own laws and ways of life. The same language was spoken in all.
- The first Olympic Games were held in the city state Olympia.
- Greek architecture has influenced the design of buildings all over the world.
- The alphabet that we use was influenced by the Greeks.
- In Athens, Greek styles of art, architecture, philosophy and theatre were developed – these helped our modern society along with science, language and maths
- Athens had a democratic government - this means that the people there made decisions by voting, like we now do in Britain
- They were polytheists - they believed in different gods and goddesses that were in charge of different parts of their lives.

Key Questions:

- How did the creation of democracy impact on the modern day?
- What were the key characteristics of Ancient Greece?
- How do we know about life in Ancient Greece?
- What is the most important art from this time and how is this important to find out more about the period?
- How was life different for different people living in the Ancient Greek civilisation?
- How did ancient Greece compare with Ancient Rome and Ancient Egypt?



Map of Greece:

Greece's position next to the sea (there are over 1400 islands) meant Ancient Greeks were seafaring people. Trade between the islands led to the creation of 'city-states'. Greece is a warm country, but winds from the Mediterranean and rains from the north, kept temperatures liveable and created fertile farming conditions.

Key Vocabulary and Glossary:

acropolis	the citadel of an ancient Greek city
architecture	the art of planning, designing and constructing buildings
Athens	the centre of the Ancient Greek world, now the capital
city state	a strong building in or near a city, where people could shelter for safety
civilisation	a human society with its own social organisation and culture.
democracy	a fair political system where all adults vote for an elected government. This government then makes decisions on how to run the country.
empire	a number of individual nations that are all controlled by the government or ruler of one particular country
military	relating to or belonging to the army
philosophy	the study or creation of theories about basic things such as the nature of existence, knowledge, and thought, or about how people should live
Parthenon	A former temple in Athens
seafaring	working as a sailor or travelling regularly on the sea
Sparta	A famous city state that focussed on a strong military and total discipline.

Key People:

- **Alexander the Great** was the king of Macedonia or Ancient Greece. He is considered one of the greatest military commanders in history. He conquered much of Asia and Europe.
- **Aristotle** is the earliest natural historian whose work has survived in some detail. He made many of the first observations of the plant and animal kingdoms
- **Plato** thought about and discussed what makes people human and what is human nature. Plato believed that men and women had the same intellectual powers.
